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

I am Marthinus de Wet, a 45 year old recovering drug addict and living proof of God's mercy. In school I was an avid sportsman and part

of the school's marching band. I

wanted to do my LLB after school, but Life had other plans.

I worked as a restaurant manager where the hours are long & gruelling. I was introduced to CAT in 2006, when one of the waiters used in the bathrooms, and I wanted to try and feel the "energy boost" that it apparently provides. I started using CAT recreationally, "just on weekends," but before I knew it, I was using daily.

I changed jobs and I was a "functional" addict, being able work long hours - until my "hobby" was discovered by my employer. Within the space of two months, I lost my job, my flat, and my

car. I had to move in with my parents in a retirement village, but I just couldn't stop using. holiday and the day after I left, I used again, but learned how hide it well.

In Jan 2016 my mother passed away and while I wanted to quit using, but I was so deep in addiction, that I moved from CAT to crystal meth.

In 2013 received the

opportunity to go to rehab. I ended up

going, because my

parents expected

me to. Rehab felt more like a paid

With addiction comes wrong friends, places and things and in Dec 2016 I was part of an armed robbery with the person who introduced me to crystal meth. We made the mistake of robbing a lady seeking a lift. The next morning, we were arrested by the police, as a case of armed robbery was opened by the lady, as she remembered the car's number plate.

I was granted bail, but with my family taking the Tough Love approach didn't pay my bail. During the time that I was in prison, my dad became ill, and in Feb 2017, he bailed me out of prison. I got to spend time at



home with him, after which he was admitted to hospital and never came home.

I was now on the streets, as I had

nowhere to go. I spoke to a friend of mine that is a Warrant-officer in the SAPS, who offered me ONE opportunity to fix my life.


FRC offered me a "free bed" that same day. That day God showed me that HE has never left me.

I was serious about my recovery and in my 2nd month of the program, I requested extend and completed a 6 month program. I became a volunteer at FRC, on 1 Oct 2017.

My court case for the armed robbery still lie ahead and FRC supported me throughout, making sure I attended court. In Nov 2018 I received the biggest shock of my life - I was found GUILTY. I cried and shouted in anger, because I have changed my life, and in the blink of an eye, everything was swept away from me. I was sentenced to 14 years imprisonment, of which 7years were suspended. A lot of thoughts went through my head, suicide being one of them.

At a church service in prison, one of the Ministry Team ladies prayed for me. She also read Jeremiah 29:11 to me. After that I was back to being furious with

> God. 'cause changed my life, I accepted HIM in my life, but still I was sent to prison, why did HE turn HIS back on me ? Not knowing He had a plan with me there. It was tough staying sober in prison, as drugs are available, but with God, and the support of family and FRC in my life, I made it through. I was a part of a church group in prison, and was able to offer help to those who wanted to become sober.






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
PASTOR MIKE GOBEL SPIRITUAL AWAKENING

Finding the Truth to Biblical
Interpretation according to God's Word
(Part 1)

"16 All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness,..." — 2 Timothy 3:16 (NKJV)

Introduction

Over the coming months, I will be presenting a doctrinal teaching series in Testify Magazine — a work the Lord has laid heavily upon my heart. As a servant of Christ, I urge every believer, especially those who earnestly desire to grow in spiritual maturity, to approach this series with reverence and discernment. It is intended to sharpen your



We are living in an age where truth has become a rare commodity. Nearly every stream of information — from the media to pulpits, classrooms, and even digital platforms — is subject to manipulation. Artificial Intelligence (AI), metadata algorithms, and human agendas subtly shape the way information is interpreted and delivered. Whether through social media, television, entertainment, or even religious content, what is presented to us is seldom neutral. Instead, it is filtered to support the worldviews and objectives of a powerful minority.

This is not the realm of conspiracy theory, but rather the reality of our time. Since the Garden of Eden, the enemy has sought to twist truth and sow deception. Scripture bears testimony to how even religious leaders, entrusted with the oracles of God, became tools of distortion. We find an example of this in Matthew 16:1–12, where the Pharisees and Sadducees attempted to manipulate truth to maintain their own influence and agenda. Their leaven — that is, their doctrine — was not rooted in divine revelation but in self-preservation and spiritual blindness.

""Then the Pharisees and Sadducees came and testing Him [Jesus] asked that He would show them a sign from heaven. 2 He answered and said to them, "When it is evening you say, 'It will be fair weather, for the sky is red'; 3 and in the morning, 'It will be foul weather today, for the sky is red and threatening.' Hypocrites! You know how to discern the face of the sky, but you cannot discern the signs of the times. 4 A wicked and adulterous generation seeks after a sign, and no sign shall be given to it except the sign of the prophet Jonah." And He left them and departed.

5 Now when His disciples had come to the other side, they had forgotten to take bread. 6 Then Jesus said to them, "Take heed and beware of the leaven of the Pharisees and the Sadducees."

7 And they reasoned among themselves, saying, "It is because we have taken no bread." 8 But Jesus, being aware of it, said to them, "O you of little faith, why do you reason among yourselves because you have brought no bread? 9 Do you not yet understand, or remember the five loaves of the five thousand and how many baskets you took up? 10 Nor the seven loaves of the four thousand and how many large baskets you took up? 11 How is it you do not understand that I did not speak to you concerning bread?—but to beware of the leaven of the Pharisees and Sadducees."

12 Then they understood that He did not tell them to beware of the leaven of bread, but of the doctrine of the Pharisees and Sadducees." — Matthew 16:1-12 (NKJV)

The Leaven of False Doctrine

The Pharisees and Sadducees were sects deeply entrenched in the religious and political life of Israel. The Pharisees claimed Mosaic authority for their rigid interpretations of the Law, while the Sadducees — defenders of temple authority — often dismissed supernatural truths such as the resurrection. Jesus rebuked both groups not for ignorance, but for deliberate unbelief. They could interpret the weather, yet they were blind to the signs of the Messiah standing before them.

Jesus warned His disciples, "Beware of the leaven of the Pharisees and Sadducees." At first, they misunderstood, thinking He referred to bread. But soon they realised He was cautioning them against the doctrine —the subtle, corrupting influence —of these religious leaders. (Matthew 16:12)

What was their real problem? It wasn't a lack of evidence. It was a lack of honesty, humility, and faith. They had hardened their hearts against divine truth.

"37 But although He had done so many signs before them, they did not believe in Him,

38 that the word of Isaiah the prophet might be fulfilled, which he spoke: "Lord, who has believed our report? And to whom has the arm of the Lord been revealed?"

39 Therefore they could not believe, because Isaiah said again:

40 "He has blinded their eyes and hardened their hearts, Lest they should see with their eyes, Lest they should understand with their hearts and turn, so that I should heal them." — John 12:37–40 (NKJV)

And sadly, that same spirit is alive in many modern religious circles today. There are multitudes who profess belief in God yet deny the divinity of Jesus Christ, choosing instead to worship a version of "God" that suits their personal or ideological preferences.

False gods, False gospels

We live in a generation not unlike that which Jesus described as "wicked and adulterous" (Matthew 16:4). This was not a charge of physical adultery, but of spiritual adultery — the betrayal of the covenant with God in favour of man-made ideologies, traditions, and philosophies. As Isaiah warned, "They have forsaken the Lord...they are estranged and backward" (Isaiah 1:4). And James echoes, "Do you not know that friendship with the world is enmity with God?" (James 4:4)

Today, many have fashioned for themselves false gods out of religious hype, worldly entertainment, and motivational speaking devoid of biblical truth. Even within so-called Spirit-filled churches, worship has often been reduced to performance, while doctrine has been compromised for popularity. The true Gospel is not about appearing culture — it is about confronting sin, calling for repentance, and pointing to Christ.

One glaring example is the Church's silence or outright compromise on the matter of same-sex unions and the LGBTQ+ movement. Rather than standing firmly on the Word of God, too many have bowed to cultural pressure. This is not simply a "social issue;" it is a doctrinal one, a spiritual battle over the integrity of Scripture and the Lordship of Christ. It is therefore critical that the church and its leaders preach and teach a message from the Word of God that is not misinterpreted or watered-down but that is accurate, biblical, and doctrinally sound.

As the Apostle Paul warned, "For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine, but according to their own desires, because they have itching ears, they will heap up for themselves teachers." (2 Timothy 4:3).

We are sadly already living in those times. Because of this, the wisdom of God and proper discernment is severely lacking within the body of Christ. People are confused, swayed by worldly opinions, and unable to differentiate between truth and deception. They click the 'delete' button on what they don't like, including the hard truths of Scripture and that applies to both believers and non-believers alike.

Understanding the Source of Truth

Before we can interpret Scripture correctly, we must ask: "Who is God to me?" If we do not know Him intimately, if we have not submitted to His Lordship, then we approach His Word withcarnal minds and worldly filters. We risk becoming like those Paul described in 2 Timothy 3:7:

"Always learning and never able to come to the knowledge of the truth." True interpretation begins with reverence. Proverbs 1:7 declares, "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge." Without that fear—that holy awe and submission—we will always distort God's message to suit our desires.

Furthermore, the Holy Spirit is the divine Interpreter of God's Word as described to us in John14:26 and 1 Corinthians 2:10-14).

26 But the [a]Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My name, He will teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance all things that I said to you" — John 14:26 (NKJV).

And again, in Corinthians:

"10 But God has revealed them to us through His Spirit. For the Spirit searches all things, yes, the deep things of God. 11 For what man knows the things of a man except the spirit of the man which is in him? Even so no one knows the things of God except the Spirit of God. 12 Now we have received, not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit who is from God, that we might know the things that have been freely given to us by God. 13 These things we also speak, not in words which man's wisdom teaches but which the [a]Holy Spirit teaches, comparing spiritual things with spiritual. 14 But the natural man does not receive the things of the Spirit of God, for they are foolishness to him; nor can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned" — 1 Corinthians 2:10–14 (NKJV).

Without His illumination, even the most educated theologians or religious leader can become blind guides. The Word must be spiritually discerned.

The Consequence of Compromised Doctrine

When the Church abdicates its prophetic role, society suffers. Our cognitive reasoning, beliefs, and behaviours become increasingly shaped by secular ideologies rather than by the eternal truth of God's Word. We crave convenience over conviction, entertainment over edification, and motivational speeches over anointed preaching.

Yet Jesus made it clear: it is the *doctrine* of the Word — properly understood and rightly divided — that will set us free (John 8:32; 2 Timothy 2:15). That freedom cannot be found through casual reading or surface-level interpretation. It requires a relationship with the Author of the Word.

Without a deep, living relationship with God, our interpretations remain subjective opinions rather than Spirit-illuminated truth.

Rediscovering the Right Starting Point

For much of my Christian life, I was taught that if we simply read the Bible and prayed, the Holy Spirit would reveal its meaning. While that is indeed a part of the process, it is incomplete. What was often neglected was this essential truth: Our understanding of Scripture is only as accurate as our understanding of God Himself.

We cannot interpret divine truth apart from knowing the Divine Author. Without intimacy with God — without reverence, obedience, and ongoing transformation — even Scripture can be misunderstood or misused (2 Peter 3:16). Biblical interpretation must begin and end with God, not with man.

Our position or understanding of who God is, is vital (key) to the effectiveness and accuracy of the interpretation or even understanding of God's Word. Biblical doctrine could never be truly understood if we do not have a fundamental understanding of the Source of that Truth. Without that relationship to our Creator, that information simply becomes misguided opinion. The power lies in the proper interpretation to the nature of its origin, as is written in John 1:1 "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." This must be the starting point of our faith and trust in God and His Word.

The Power of Authenticity and Truth

I recently read an article in which the writer made the following rather profound statement: "Being authentic takes no energy – it's all the pretending that wears us out."

At first, I nodded in agreement. Of course, authenticity should be effortless! But then I thought about that statement again...and something didn't quite add up. If being ourselves were truly effortless, why does it often feel so hard to accomplish?

In an ideal world, authenticity would be our 'natural state'—no second-guessing, no filtering of words, no adjusting who we are, and no putting on masks to fit into our surroundings. But is this not the reality we currently live in? Many of us have spent years (even decades) absorbing messages, reading books, going to religious conferences, listening to sermons on a Sunday and watching the odd podcasts about who we are, or should be. What we should want, and how we should behave. Over time, we adapt to meet these expectations, suppress even parts of ourselves to avoid judgment, and bend to fit into the "right" mould that meets the needs and desires of others.

These patterns don't just disappear overnight. They become *layers*—invisible walls between us and our true essence of who we are and of who we were meant to bein Christ. Peeling away some of those false narratives, untruths to who we areas children of God and what we should believe? That's the real work of a believer. And let's be honest—sometimes, it's exhausting. The irony of it all is that we find ourselves sometimes in a world that is less real and less truthful to what God wants and expects of us as His children.

As a result, we work so hard on our spiritual self-image which is something that should have come naturally. It is as though we are climbing a mountain just to get back to our own backyard (our 'inner self') – the spirit-led part of us that God had created before it all became influenced by the things of this world and yet when we accept Christ, we become a 'new' creation in Christ. We are meant to open ourselves up to the acceptance that it is Christ that now comes to live inside of us, and we are meant to then be led by the Spirit and not by the flesh as the Bible so eloquently denotes, "I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me" — Galatians 2:20 (NKJV).

The Journey Back to being Spirit-led

If what you have just read convicts you in some way, trust me you're not alone. Some days, the journey of rediscovering yourself will feel liberating—like breathing fresh air after being stuck in a room full of smokers for too long. Other days, it might feel overwhelming, filled with self-doubt, like having to deal with some of those old wounds that we so easily seem to try and cover up but never try to root out the cause of the pain, and then having to deal with the invisible force of resistance that comes from being led by the flesh and not by the Spirit.

How often have you not read your Bible and beyond the reading of its words you received no response, no revelation or move of the Spirit? How often have you prayed and asked God for some kind of divine intervention and it never came? I don't think there is a single believer out there that can with honesty say that they haven't felt the same feeling.

But here's what I've come to learn through trial and error: It doesn't have to be so hard. For me, discovering the priorities of life and placing God first before anything else in my life has been life changing. Of course, I accept that maybe my situation is slightly different to a normal citizen or child of God, in that I have surrendered my entire life to Christ to be His disciple and to take up the call of becoming a servant of the Lord. In some way that could be different, in that I previously needed to depend on my own strength, power, and ability to accomplish my personal and career goals in life.

Prior to going into ministry, I needed to perform and achieve some level of corporate success to be able to live a certain lifestyle and now I am comfortable with much less and rely entirely on God's mercy and grace for whatever He decides to bless me with. This form of commitment, submission and dependence has given me a gentle and humble way to release old patterns of self-dependence, reconnect with God on a deeper level, and to move forward even under the strains of daily struggles and natural obstacles or difficulties with a hope and an inner peace and joy for whatever tomorrow might bring.

However, come to think of it, it is no different from someone that is living a life that is dependent on a job, a salary, business turn-over, profit and loss, etc. These are not or should not be the things that determine or govern our connection or relationship to God. They are merely patterns of daily living, routines of survival and existence but what matters most is how these patterns control and shape our daily lifestyle and our existence as children of God.

Are these core patterns of existence shaped and moulded around our family, children, businesses, jobs, social routines, and our wealth or are they shaped and moulded around, first and foremost our relationship to God. That is the fundamental question we need to establish. Ultimately, the answer to this question will determine the outcome of our guided or misguided understanding or interpretation of God and His Word. Instead of forcing myself to perform various religious routines or change various bad habits or distractions, I began to allow the Holy Spirit to transform my inner man; my thoughts, actions, and behaviour by concentrating more of God's Word.

I began to read less of worldly books on philosophy, self-enrichment, motivational books by so called gurus of wealth creation, science fiction and all kinds of philosophical rubbish that drew my attention and focus more and more away from the things of God. I began to filter my mind with more of God's Word and suddenly I noticed an immediate change in my decision-making processes.

My speech, actions and behaviour became more spiritually orientated rather than worldly focused. This conscious decision to draw nearer to the things of God allowed for my transformation to happen naturally. No pressure. No burnout. No false expressions or expectations. No manifestation or falling down in church and rolling around like a crazy person being possessed by demons. Nothing like that, just a steady, supported journey with the Holy Spirit that I now walk with God and not alone.

Entering a New Season as the Body of Christ

I strongly believe that the body of Christ is entering a new season in which God is calling on His church to move into a higher level of devotion and obedience in our faith and trust in Christ. We cannot as the body of Christ simply be content with the status quo if such position or level of devotion is not fully committed to the principles and laws of God.

God cannot use us effectively for the extension of His Kingdom or bless us with the fruit of the Spirit if we are not willing to walk in obedience to His Word. To do that we need not only to embrace His Word, but we also need a clear and accurate biblical interpretation, revelation and understanding of God's Word to be able to transfer or translate the Message of the Gospel to a broken and lost world. The Bible tells us in Psalm 119:34 "Give me understanding, so that I may keep your law and obey it with all my heart."

God also says through the Apostle Paul in 1 Corinthians 15:1-4 (NKJV):

"Moreover, brethren, I declare to you the gospel which I preached to you, which also you received and in which you stand, 2 by which also you are saved, if you [hold fast] that word which I preached to you—unless you believed in vain. 3 For I delivered to you first of all that which I also received: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, 4 and that He was buried, and that He rose again the third day according to the Scriptures,..."

Our Heavenly Father has purposefully given to us His Word (the Gospel of Jesus Christ) that we may not only receive the 'gift of our salvation' through Christ but that we also "hold fast" (believe/trust/adhere/apply and 'share') to the entirety of Scripture (meaning, believe in and adhering to both the Old and the New Testament) "for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness." Clearly, from the key-note passage of Scripture in 2 Timothy 3:16 we can determine that God is saying that there must be a progression, a transformation, a 'moving forward' so to speak to a greater and more powerful understanding of God's Word.

We should be continuously filling our 'spiritual well' (our heart, mind, body, and spirit) with the 'refreshing water' ('water' is a multifaceted symbol representing purification, cleansing, spiritual renewal, and the Holy Spirit, as well as God's grace and life-giving power) from the 'well of our faith,' (the Source of Life) which is Christ.

Do not allow this life-giving water from your spiritual well to become stagnant and undrinkable because of all the social, cultural and yes even unwanted religious toxins and polluted particles that float all around us, or worse, allow your spiritual well to dry up because of the lack of maintenance (maintaining a healthy foundation to the principles and doctrines of our faith in Christ). Make sure that there is a consistent and continuous flow of fresh "living water" running in and out of your spiritual well – feeding and nourishing not only yourself but flowing into the lives (spiritual wells) of others who come to drink and be filled by your knowledge, wisdom and understanding of God's Word.

This analogy of 'feeding the spirit' (our own 'spirit') and 'being fed by the Spirit' (the Holy Spirit) symbolises the words in the Bible that says, "making fishers of men." A phrase from Matthew 4: 19 where Jesus calls Simon and Andrew to follow Him and promises to make them "fishers of men." As a devoted believer and child of God, one of the desires of your heart should always be to want to get to know God more, wanting to continuously be filled by His Spirit and wanting to draw nearer to Him in mind, body and spirit. Hebrews 4:16 (NKJV) says, "Let us therefore come boldly to the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need." The primary purpose of us drawing nearer to God is that He may fill us with His Holy Spirit that we can become through Him that beacon of light and hope unto a very dark and sinful world.

Conclusion

In the months to come, I will explore foundational principles of biblical interpretation: context, covenant, Christocentricity, and the role of the Holy Spirit in hermeneutics. We will examine church history, doctrinal divisions, and why unity in the church and in the Truth matters.

But for now, I leave you with this: If we are to become effective interpreters of Scripture, we must not merely seek knowledge but pursue holiness. We must draw near to God; only then can we proclaim truth with authority in a world that so desperately needs it.

Due to my stroke I experienced, I could not take part in the outreach.


Arukah Evangelisasie had a blessed outreach on 10 May to Jerigo Upliftment camp in Eloff close to Delmas.

Remarkable women who positively transformed the lives of thousands of young people!

May brought the warmth of Mother's Day, a heartfelt occasion dedicated to honouring the remarkable women who shape the future through their nurturing spirits. Among these inspiring figures, we highlight two formidable women in ministry, Lidia Dube and Esther Bornman of the KwaSizabantu Mission. Their unwavering devotion and profound impact resonate not only within their communities but also in the hearts and lives of the next generation they guide and uplift.

Serving others unconditionally is a calling that requires a unique kind of person. This



often leads them to engage in missionary work that can be both demanding and frequently overlooked. Over the years, I have volunteered at various mission stations, immersing myself in their critical efforts and bringing attention to missionaries' remarkable selflessness and profound impact.

One mission that has left a lasting impression on me is KwaSizabantu, nestled in Kranskop in the landscapes of KwaZulu-Natal, established over 55 years ago by the visionary Reverend Erlo Stegen, who passed on in 2023. During my numerous visits to KwaSizabantu, I encountered two extraordinary women of faith who had initially sought assistance from the mission during challenging times. Inspired by the care and support they received, they chose to dedicate their lives to the mission, working alongside the team to uplift others in need. Their stories are just two of many demonstrating the transformative power of compassion and commitment in this community.

LIDIA DUBE, SPIRITUAL MOTHER TO MANY

To truly appreciate the incredible impact of the late Reverend's work, one could fill a book recounting his journey since his life was restored and he sought a revival in his ministry. This revival has left a lasting legacy. Another key figure in this movement is Lidia Dube, an inspiring leader from the isiZulu community where Stegen began his mission. Since her own life was transformed, Lidia has been unwavering in her support of the Stegen ministry, dedicating herself especially to guiding the youth toward a deeper relationship with the Lord. In a true act of obedience, Lidia initiated a youth conference that celebrated its remarkable 50 years in 2024. These gatherings have brought thousands of young people twice a year to KwaSizabantu to encounter the Lord, many for the very first time, igniting hope and faith for generations to come!

Lida spearheaded the CYPSA (Concerned Young People of SA) restoration program. Although she has never married and has never enjoyed being a mother, she has become the spiritual mother of thousands of young people. Now in her late seventies, she lives a pious life as a missionary at KwaSizabantu, providing help and counselling to many who face life's challenges. Her counselling is widely recognised, and countless people, including royal households, come from near and far to seek her guidance and messages of hope. She never allows anyone to leave her without a message of hope.

But Lidia's childhood was not without challenges, and the constant arguments

between her parents initially hurt her outlook on life. She was constantly involved in fistfights but and her experience in street fights led her to become a gang leader, often instigating fights at school. Her behaviour caused significant problems for her parents and the teachers who crossed paths with her.

Lidia's mother became involved in the ministry of the late Rev Erlo Stegen, and she sought help for her daughter's bad behaviour. Lidia eventually got involved in the ministry. She and her mother were some of the few co-workers who played a role in starting the KwaSizabantu Mission over 55 years ago.

ESTHER BORNMAN, SOFT-SPOKEN BUT STRONG IN MINISTRY

Esther Bornman is truly a remarkable missionary at KwaSizabantu. She embodies the spirit of a loving spiritual mother to many young boys who come seeking guidance and support. Every conversation with this inspiring woman is uplifting, and walking alongside her throughout the Mission grounds is a beautiful experience. You can feel the warmth and admiration from everyone who stops her to express their gratitude for her heartfelt dedication and kindness.

Esther has certainly faced her share of challenges and heartache. She moved to KwaSizabantu on December 23, 1986, with her husband, Daniel, and their three young children. It was Daniel's dream to work there, and he became the headmaster of the Domino Servite School at the Mission. Tragically, just weeks later, on January 12, 1987, he passed away unexpectedly from a heart attack, leaving his missionary aspirations unfulfilled. Yet, Esther's resilience shines brightly as she has stayed committed to KwaSizabantu, continuing her work with grace and determination.

While two of her adult children have ventured on to explore their own paths, Esther's loyalty to KwaSizabantu is unwavering. Her eldest daughter, Hanna, remains a vital part of the Mission, working at the school. I had the joy of meeting Hanna's three wonderful daughters, who, along with their husbands, are actively contributing to the Mission's efforts. They are such talented and lovely individuals who passionately embrace the incredible work being done here.

Esther says the people at KwaSizabantu accepted her and her family with open arms. They were there for her and her family when her husband died and in all her hours of need. It never changed over the years. Esther said, "Ever since my

husband died, the house of the late Erlo Stegen (on the Missio's grounds), has been a natural haven for me. The Stegens became like my family. Kay Stegen was my precious friend, our school principal, and an outstanding counsellor. I learned a lot from her. I helped her prepare food for countless youth and ministers' conferences when she was still alive.

"Only after Kay's death did I get to know Lidia Dube, who started the youth conferences and CYPSA programme at the Mission, better. She became the person I started going to for advice and prayer. In 2009, I started working with Lidia at CYPSA. I helped set up our office and helped with administration and counselling. I still assist with devotionals and counselling for the men who come for help. I am also involved in counselling after the services in youth services and during the biannual youth conferences."

My conversations with Ester were heartwarming and uplifting. She cares deeply for the broken and the needy. Her family at KwaSizabantu and the other residents speak highly of her. Despite her age, she still makes a huge difference in society and changes the lives of people rejected by their families and society.

OUR JOURNEY THEIR STORY

The KwaSizabantu Mission's CYPSA program has made a remarkable impact, transforming the lives of over 20,000 young individuals. I'm excited to share a short version of one of the heartfelt testimonies from a young man whose journey has inspired him to positively contribute to society. 

This is a short version of his testimony: "For over 10 years, I have experienced the unceasing kindness, love, selflessness and patience of the co-workers, mentors, and seniors at CYPSA and the KwaSizabantu Mission. These people have surrendered their lives completely to help people like me and rescue them from the gates of hell. My father also met the Lord and now lives and works at the Mission, partly because of the change in my life. I married a young lady whose life is also dedicated to Christ and His work, and we serve the Lord together. We have been blessed with a beautiful baby girl."

Note: Since 2009, the KwaSizabantu Mission has been running a restoration program (not a rehabilitation program) called the CYPSA restoration program to help those with addiction issues and social ills. CYPSA stands for the Concerned Young People of SA, and the program stands firm against the devastation caused by drugs, immorality, HIV/Aids, human trafficking, crime, prostitution, pornography and abuse. It raises awareness for these issues by visiting schools, communities, and prisons. Over 20,000 young people have been helped through this program since it was founded. CYPSA has, in collaboration with the KwaSizabantu Mission, started a skills development program to give them a better chance to obtain employment. Executive Mayor Linda Jaquet leads not with ego, but with empathy—a mother of the town, guiding with vision and compassion.

Azuke Ntapane and Ingrid Wolfaardt, directors of the Journey to Jazz Festival, brought their full selves to the table—strategic, creative, prophetic. They didn't just plan an event. They hosted God.

Renicha Mooneys, leading the PACT J2J Youth Crew, nurtured the next generation with both strength and softness, empowering young men and women to stand firm in their purpose.

And while worship filled the air, security and service held the ground.

Captain Carlia Vosloo, with Warrant Officer Elise Frey, stood as watchwomen on the wall. With quiet authority and spiritual awareness, they stewarded safety—reminding us of Isaiah 62:6: "I have posted watchmen on your walls, Jerusalem; they will never be silent day or night."

EMS Coordinator Zubiada Abelson, ever watchful, mirrored the heart of the Good Samaritan, ready to respond in love and care.

One unforgettable highlight was the performance by the Outeniqua High School Jazz Band. Under the watchful eye of their dedicated music teacher, these young musicians released a sound that stirred the spirit and silenced doubt. Their harmony was more than notes—it was evidence of purpose, passion, and prophetic release. Their music wasn't just heard; it ministered.

The music started, and heads began to bob, feet started tapping — you could feel the rhythm crawling up your spine, urging you to dance. The piece was original, yet deeply familiar in feeling, as though each note had been waiting for this moment to be born. Their voices blended like seasoned performers, rising like incense, pure and passionate. It wasn't just a performance — it was worship, it was joy, it was soul. They were like angels on that stage, delivering a moment that no one saw coming, but no one would ever forget.

As I stood among the crowd, watching the children dance, something within me broke open. Joy spilled into the streets. Hope lit every face. These children—so full of life, so unbothered by status or circumstance—reminded me of Jesus' words in Matthew 19:14: "Let the little children come to me... for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these."

Despite hardships, there was a tangible joy in Prince Albert. It wasn't superficial. It was holy. This town, though small, gives much—hospitality, honour, and humility. As Hebrews 13:2 teaches, "Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing so some have entertained angels without knowing it." I have no doubt I encountered a few during those five days.

The festival ended, but the oil keeps flowing.

The community of Prince Albert left an imprint on my spirit. Their resilience is not of this world—it's rooted in heaven. Their leadership is not about position—it's about posture. And their worship is not about performance—it's about presence.

This isn't just a town. It's a tabernacle. And I believe God is building something lasting here—brick by brick, song by song, prayer by prayer.

As I left, my heart overflowed. Not with sadness, but with a holy awe. I came to witness a festival. I left having encountered a revival.

Let this be a call to the nations: From the Karoo to the corners of the earth, may the beauty of holiness, the power of hope, and the freedom of worship arise. And may God's favour rest upon Prince Albert and every person who carries the fire forward.

In cultivating a rich spiritual foundation within our families, we not only




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
